April is National County Government Month

Counties take pride in our responsibility to protect and enhance the health, well-being, and safety of our residents in efficient and cost-effective ways. Counties provide health services, administer justice, keep communities safe, and foster economic opportunities. Many residents do not realize that Adams County has 30 Departments that include Courts, Prison, Department of Emergency Services, District Attorney, Public Defender, CYS, Probation, Domestic Relations, Planning and many other departments that include 530 staff. Pennsylvania County Government provides a multitude of essential services to our residents. The Board would like to recognize and thank all of our Adams County staff members and elected officials for helping to make Adams County the great place to live and work that it is!

Pennsylvania Invests To Protect Farms

Recently, Pennsylvania protected 3,528 more acres on 40 farms in 19 counties from future development, investing more than \$9.7 million in state, and county dollars in preserving prime farmland for tomorrow. The investment also leverages \$735,170 that will go toward preserving farms on waitlists in six counties. These approvals bring Pennsylvania's total to 6,044 farms and 611,620 acres of farmland that will be forever protected from commercial, industrial, or residential development. The 40 newly preserved farms are located in **Adams**, Berks, Bradford, Butler, Chester, Cumberland, Dauphin, Erie, Franklin, Greene, Lackawanna, Lancaster, Lebanon, Mifflin, Monroe, Northampton, Snyder, Tioga, and York counties. "Protecting prime farmland is public policy that works, and a priority we all agree on," Agriculture Secretary and Adams County native Russell Redding said. "It's a long-lasting, highly effective partnership among state, federal, county, and local governments and the farm families who are committed to feeding future generations. Together, we are protecting Pennsylvania's priceless resources and sustaining our economy."

By selling their land's development rights, landowners preserve their farms, protecting the land from future residential, commercial, or industrial development. Farm families often sell their land at below market value to ensure that it will remain farmland. Pennsylvania partners with county and sometimes local governments and non-profits to purchase the development rights, ensuring a strong future for farming and food security. Pennsylvania has a long-standing partnership with USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), through the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program and the Regional Conservation Partnership Program, the first of its kind, which has invested more than \$16 million to date to implement measures on farms that will improve water and soil quality in the Chesapeake Bay Watershed. Notable farms preserved recently include The Hanover Shoe Farm #28, a 213.60-acre internationally recognized horse farm in Conewago Township, Adams County. It is the first of several Hanover Shoe Farms that will be preserved over the next year in partnership with NRCS. According to a recent study by the Adams County Office of Planning and Development, the annual economic impact of the equine industry in the Adams County is \$49 million. In 2019, horses bred at Hanover Shoe Farms produced more earnings for jockeys than any other horse farms in the world.

Farms recently protected in Adams County during this initiative include Hanover Shoe Farm (213-acre horse farm), Wayne H. Mummert Farm (111-acre crop farm), and Doyle Waybright Farm (124-acre crop farm), which was a 100% easement donation to the County! The total investment from the state was \$601,738 and from the county \$220,442.


Conservation District Tire Recycling Even

On May 21st, the Adams County Conservation District will be hosting a Tire Recycling Event at the Adams County Agricultural and Natural Resources Center from 8am-1pm. Advanced registration and payment are required by Monday, May 2nd. This program is only available to Adams County residents and no commercial businesses may participate. The cost to recycle the tires is \$3 per tire. Payment is non-refundable by check only. A maximum of 20 tires may be recycled per household. The tires must be off the rims, be free of mud and debris, and must not exceed 48 inches in diameter or 14 inches in width. For
