#### NATIONAL SUICIDE PREVENTION MONTH

### Suicide Prevention Awareness Month

At Wednesday's meeting the Board approved a proclamation declaring September as *Suicide Prevention Awareness Month in Adams County*. The proclamation was presented by Healthy Adams County and the Behavioral Task Force. Millions of Americans consider suicide, and many of us have been personally touched by suicide. The campaign this year focuses on awareness, learning about warning signs, risk factors, myths, and facts. Prevent Suicide PA and partner organizations including the Adams County Library System, Knouse Foods, WellSpan Health, all members of the behavioral health task force and our local restaurants and bars, are committing to connecting with those who are struggling and encouraging communities, organizations, and governments to work together to prevent suicide. There is hope, and it begins with each of us to do our part.

In 2019, suicide was the 10th leading cause of death in the United States, and the second leading cause of death for young people between the ages of 10 and 34. For many, feelings of isolation, exhaustion, and economic and public health-related anxieties associated with the COVID-19 pandemic have increased rates of depression and have sparked concern that we will see a further increase in suicide rates. In Adams County since 2010 there have been 168 suicides, the majority males and cause of death by gunshot. Too many of our Nation's veterans and active military service members have also considered suicide or taken their own lives. In many cases, they did not receive the mental health services they need and deserve. Suicide awareness and prevention begins with each of us. If you suspect someone has depression or despair, please seek professional assistance. You could be saving someone's life!

# **Upcoming November 8th General Election**

A reminder of some important General Election dates.

- The last day to register to vote or make any changes to your current registration before the November election is **October 24.**
- The last day to apply for a mail-in or civilian absentee ballot is **November 1.**

Mail-in and absentee ballots <u>must be received by 8:00 pm</u> by the County Board of Elections on **November 8** (Election Day). Mailing the ballot on election day will void your vote.

## **Pennsylvania Population Declines**

The Independent Fiscal Office (IFO) released its August 2022 report on county income patterns, which uses recent demographic and income trends at the county level to analyze per capita income trends across the commonwealth.

Overall, the IFO reported an average population decrease of 0.03% per year from 2017 through 2020, ranging from the highest increase

of 0.87% (Cumberland County) to the lowest decrease of 2.07% (Cameron

County), with

population generally declining in the north, central and southwestern parts of the state compared to population growth in the south and southeastern parts of the state. From 2017 through 2020, 59 counties showed personal income gains of 1.4% per year, exceeding inflation and implying real income gains. Statewide personal income growth ranged from ranged from a 0.8% decrease (Cameron County) to a 4.6% increase (Forest County).

## **State & CCAP Broadband Initiative**

The Pennsylvania Broadband Development Authority (PBDA), created under Act 96 of 2021, recently submitted an initial draft plan to the federal government to access \$5 million in planning funds from the \$100 million Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) program funding each state is guaranteed. Additionally, the Authority has developed four subcommittees – data and mapping, technical, workforce and supply chain and outreach and education – to allow for stakeholders to provide input and expertise to the Authority in development of the broader state plan, which is required to apply for the state's share of the \$42 billion national pot. CCAP has been appointed a seat on the data and mapping subcommittee and will also have opportunities to provide input and feedback to other committees.

At its August meeting, the CCAP Board approved the creation of a CCAP Broadband Task Force to help direct specific county asks as part of the statewide broadband planning process, as well as provide a timely and effective feedback loop to assure CCAP can fully represent Pennsylvania counties as critical stakeholders. The task force will be chaired by Clearfield County commissioner Dave Glass and members represent county commissioners and council members, chief clerks, solicitors, GIS professionals, planning directors and IT professionals. Adams County Commissioner Qually has been appointed to the CCAP Broadband Task Force by the CCAP Board of Directors.

#### **New Courthouse Breakroom**

The newly renovated courthouse breakroom was unveiled for Paula's "after proclamation reception." It has received rave reviews.
